

THE SECRET OF THE KINGDOM SERIES WHY? The reason I wrote about the Kingdom of God.

"If I were to ask you what are the three main things you wish to accomplish with this series, what would they be?" My educator friend wanted to know why I had written so much for so long, and what I hoped to achieve as a result.

We were at a restaurant, so I started writing my thoughts on a napkin (I've always wanted to do that). You would think the answers would come easily, automatically. But I had to think hard to put into words what was, to some extent, hidden deep inside. Below is what I wrote and went on to explain to my friend.

1. TO PROVIDE A FRAMEWORK

Christians need a clear understanding of the Kingdom of God. They need to see how the parts come together to form a whole. Most books zero in on a specific portion of the Kingdom but don't explain how that portion fits into the big picture. We need a reference, a system, a framework to better process what the Kingdom is all about.

My desire is to pass along what I have learned from studying the Kingdom for over 20 years and what the Lord has shown me in His Word. The framework is made up of the four Biblical aspects of the Kingdom. Understanding this "secret" will bring tremendous clarity and understanding to the Biblical message.

2. TO ENCOURAGE

We live in a fallen and broken world. Life is tough. Suffering and pain are our constant companions. We need to be reminded that: a) Life does make sense because God has a purpose—for our lives and for our suffering—and this is better understood in the context of the Kingdom of God. And, b) This life is temporary and what comes next is beyond our 1. <u>Framework</u> - clear understanding of the Kingdom 2. <u>Encourage</u> - we're going to reign with Christ! 3. <u>Influence</u> - behavior and "mentality!" via Kingdom Values.

wildest imagination. Just think of it: the Bible promises we will reign with Christ throughout eternity! That puts our present experience in perspective and gives us solid hope. Understanding the Kingdom brings much needed encouragement.

3. TO INFLUENCE

You may have heard the old expression: "They are so heavenly-minded they are no earthly good." Well, that is rare indeed nowadays. We need more heavenly-minded people—Christians with a Kingdom mentality whose behavior is guided by Kingdom Values.


We need to rediscover the importance of righteousness and incorporate the godliness, justice, and values that it produces.

I hope this series will be a positive influence in your life, motivating you to live out those values that are important to our Lord and King. And that you will encourage others to do the same. After all, the Bible instructs us: "Let us think of ways to motivate one another to acts of love and good works" (Hebrews 10:24 - NLT).







Understanding the Kingdom is essential to comprehending the message of the Old and New Testaments—especially the teachings of Jesus—because the Kingdom is the central theme of the Bible.

The aspects of the Kingdom presented in this book are not something grabbed out of thin air. Rather, they are Biblical and consistent with what highly regarded Christian authors present in their writings. However, this book is unique in that it shows there are four distinct Biblical

aspects, explains them, and integrates them into a systematic approach to the Kingdom.

The **Eternal Kingdom** is God's reign over all—everything and everyone, everywhere, for all time and eternity. The **Global Kingdom** is God's reign over planet Earth and includes the creation of the world, the fall, and all of human history. The **Millennial Kingdom** is Christ's reign over the Earth after His Second Coming and transitions to the **Eternal Kingdom**, which is the eternal state or "eternity future."



The Kingdom of God is

God's rule over all creation through its universal, global, millennial and eternal aspects. Founded on righteousness and built on unchangeable values and principles, it has the purpose of glorifying God, conquering evil, redeeming sinners, testing faithfulness, and rewarding overcomers who will serve and worship Christ, while reigning with Him forever. Only through Jesus does one inherit the Kingdom.



The Kingdom's Standard

A standard is a required level of quality; something used as a measure, norm, or model in comparative evaluations, having to do with principles of conduct.

The standard of the Kingdom, which sums up all that God requires (Matthew 3:15) and all that God desires (Psalm 33:5), and against which everything is measured, is righteousness. In a sense, righteousness is God's code of conduct.

Righteous conduct flows out of a holy character. Godliness is the personal – and justice the social – face of righteousness.


The Kingdom's Values

Value has to do with worth and one's judgment of what is important in life. This leads us to ask: what is of value and precious to our King? How does our King want us to conduct our lives? What specific areas are mentioned and examples are given in His Word?

There are so many! The Values of the Kingdom of God covers 70 of the more obvious and common ones. We can divide Kingdom Values into personal (character and behavior), relational ("one another" commands), social (life mission and how we conduct our work, service and ministry in the world), and spiritual values (in relation to God). The word "righteousness" comes from two words in Hebrew and two words in Greek. The Hebrew words mean "accurate, fairly, just, justice, and what is right" and includes notions of honesty, merits, and righteous acts.

God's standards are right, fair, just and honest. There **is** a right way to live. There **is** a correct way to relate to others. There **is** a proper way to relate to God.


A Kingdom Handbook

This book is a reference guide, a handbook where you can quickly find the main Kingdom passages wherever they are found in the Bible. Each passage receives a quick commentary where its importance and meaning are pointed out. The more we examine what different passages of Scripture have to say, the better we will grasp the concepts, aspects, principles, values and truths concerning God's rule through His Kingdom. That is the purpose of this book.

They say the best commentary on the Bible is the Bible. So, the more passages we can examine on a particular subject, the better. We check, cross-reference, compare and contrast. The same holds true for the study on the Kingdom of God. You will find the Bible to be extremely consistent, even though it was written by close to 40 authors during a time span of some 1,600 years.

While Daniel is proportionally the most Kingdom-focused book in the Old Testament, Matthew is known as "the Gospel of the Kingdom." Other books— like the Psalms, Zechariah, and Revelation—also contain large portions dedicated to God's sovereign rule over all creation.

The Highlights of the Kingdom of God references passages in 33 Old Testament books and 23 New Testament books.





What this book is about

The purpose of this book, in a nutshell, is: "Keeping our eyes on Jesus, the source and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy that lay before Him endured a cross and despised the shame and has sat down at the right hand of God's throne" (Hebrews 12:2 - HCSB). This is God the Son, reigning side-by-side with God the Father, after coming to Earth and becoming our Savior. He did this so that we might reign with Him throughout eternity. Even now, "We are receiving a kingdom that cannot be shaken"— that is, a kingship, sovereignty, and authority to rule.


There is indeed a vast amount of books about Jesus. But the primary reason for writing *this* book is to celebrate Jesus as the King of the Kingdom of God. He is—and always has been—God's Son and part of the Holy Trinity. Easy to state, difficult to explain, and impossible to fully grasp, this study will try to shed some light on the topic.
